

The Seven Last Words of Christ

A Sacred Choral Work composed by Theodore Dubois

Chancel Choir, Soloists, Harp, Timpani, and Organ

Tenebrae' is Latin for shadows. At a Tenebrae Service we feel the emotion of the passion story as shared in music. This is not a service of celebration. We sing solemn hymns and hear the scriptural narratives of Jesus' final words from the cross. Seven black candles and a Christ Candle are lit. After each reading of Jesus' words a candle is extinguished until only the flame of the Christ Candle remains. The Christ Candle is carried out of the Sanctuary at the end of the service leaving us in total darkness (tenebrae).

The Tenebrae service recreates the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of the crucifixion and is left unfinished, because the story isn't over until Easter Day. It is a moving spiritually reflective service. We need to witness the full story of Jesus' last hours to truly experience the wonder of Easter morning.



Notes from Tim

As we begin the Lenten Season and recall the sacrifice that Christ made for our sins and the sins of the world through his death on the cross, we know without a doubt, that if we believe in Him and His glorious resurrection that we have the promise of salvation and will live with Him forever--eternally! That is His promise to us!

One of my favorite Lenten hymns is *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross*. The Choir will be singing this as an anthem in worship one Sunday during the season of Lent. Hymns of our faith relay a sermon and story within them:

When I survey the wondrous cross On which the Prince of Glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, And pour contempt on all my pride.

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were an offering far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my **soul**, my **life**, my **all!**

What beautiful words relayed here! This classic hymn of Isaac Watts has often been called the greatest hymn ever written. Another contemporary of Isaac Watts once said of this hymn, "There may be a few others equally as great, but there is none greater." All one needs to do to realize the truth of this statement is to sing this majestic hymn. Isaac Watts based this hymn on the Scripture reference of Galatians 6:14. "But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world." Christ's love, so amazing, so divine; demands my soul, my life, my ALL! The majestic phrases of this deeply solemn hymn are as moving today as when Watts penned them in 1707.

Watts' lifetime ambition was to be a servant of Christ, a servant to churches, and a helper of Christians. He won the hearts of a large share of the English speaking people over a long period of years. For the last thirty years of his life, he became an invalid, but devoted himself in comfortable and happy surroundings to the writing of many of the beautiful hymns we still sing in worship today. Some of them include: *Come, We That Love the Lord; Joy to the World; Alas and Did My Savior Bleed?* and many others. Watts was a contemporary of many other hymn writers including Charles Wesley and John Newton.

As we sing the great hymns of the church during this Lenten season, be attentive to the text and the message relayed in each hymn as we recount the last weeks and days of Christ's earthly life, his sufferings and crucifixion, along with the glorious news of His resurrection, and how through our music and the wonderful hymns, we affirm our faith in the living Christ!
